- WHEREAS, all meetings of the Northern Sierra Air Quality Management District Board are open and public, as required by the Ralph M. Brown Act (Cal. Gov. Code §§ 54950 54963), so that any member of the public may attend, participate, and watch the legislative bodies conduct their business; and
- WHEREAS, the Brown Act, Government Code section 54953(e), makes provisions for remote teleconferencing participation in meetings by members of a legislative body, without compliance with the requirements of Government Code section 54953(b)(3), subject to the existence of certain conditions and requirements; and
- WHEREAS, a required condition of Government Code section 54953(e) is that a state of emergency is declared by the Governor pursuant to Government Code section 8625, proclaiming the existence of conditions of disaster or of extreme peril to the safety of persons and property within the state caused by conditions as described in Government Code section 8558(b); and
- WHEREAS, a further required condition of Government Code section 54953(e) is that state or local officials have imposed or recommended measures to promote social distancing, or, the legislative body holds a meeting to determine or has determined by a majority vote that meeting in person would present imminent risks to the health and safety of attendees; and
- WHEREAS, on March 4, 2020, Governor Newsom issued a Proclamation of a State of Emergency declaring a state of emergency exists in California due to the threat of COVID-19, pursuant to the California Emergency Services Act (Government Code section 8625); and
- WHEREAS, on June 11, 2021, Governor Newsom issued Executive Order N-07-21, which formally rescinded the Stay-at-Home Order (Executive Order N-33-20), as well as the framework for a gradual, risk-based reopening of the economy (Executive Order N-60-20, issued on May 4, 2020) but did not rescind the proclaimed state of emergency; and
- WHEREAS, on June 11, 2021, Governor Newsom also issued Executive Order N-08-21, which set expiration dates for certain paragraphs of the State of Emergency Proclamation dated March 4, 2020 and other Executive Orders but did not rescind the proclaimed state of emergency; and
- WHEREAS, as of the date of this Resolution, neither the Governor nor the state Legislature have exercised their respective powers pursuant to Government Code section 8629 to lift the state of emergency either by proclamation or by concurrent resolution the state Legislature; and
- WHEREAS, the California Department of Industrial Relations has issued regulations related to COVID-19 Prevention for employees and places of employment. Issues:

CARB staff developed the Funding Agricultural Reduction Measure for Emission Reductions (FARMER) Program to meet Legislature objectives and help meet the State's criteria, toxic and greenhouse gas emission reduction goals.

The Shared Allocation Pool is specifically designated for 18 Air Districts with less than one percent of the statewide agricultural equipment emissions inventory, to ensure farmers in those Districts have the opportunity to access FARMER funding and to streamline the implementation of the FARMER program. The pooled funding consists of \$4.8 million for equipment and project related costs and \$752,000 for project implementation costs.

The Pool will continue to be managed by the Placer County Air Pollution Control District (Placer APCD). Placer APCD has entered into independent contracts with participating Districts, and will receive applications from the participating Districts that meet the minimum requirements. Placer APCD will review the list of recommended projects for accuracy and cost-effectiveness and will contact participating Districts regarding project awards.

Once the selection process has been completed and the participating District chooses to accept the project, the full responsibility for the project contract, project completion and related responsibilities as contained in the relevant guidelines rests solely with the participating air district. This includes notification to the applicant of the award and providing the applicant with a timeline for project execution and completion. Project funding is provided directly to the participating District by Placer APCD.

1. Authorize the Executive Director to enter into a memorandum of agreement with Placer County Air Pollution Control District, by approving Resolution # 2022-12.

WHEREAS, all SAP districts are required to execute an Allocation Agreement specific to each funding allocation they would like to participate in, which outlines allocation-specific deadlines and other information; and

WHEREAS, the District will review project eligibility, submit projects to PCAPCD for review and award, and submit required reporting associated with the FARMER Program; and

Open to Air Quality Management Districts and Air Pollution Control Districts

BACKGROUND

The Carl Moyer Memorial Air Quality Standards Attainment Program (Moyer Program) provides monetary grants for the incremental cost of cleaner than required technology. While the California Air Resources Board (CARB) is responsible for developing the Moyer Program Guidelines, the participating California air pollution control districts and air quality management districts (air districts) are in charge of administering the program. Section 44286(d) of the Health and Safety Code (H&SC) gives CARB the authority to reserve up to 10 percent of Moyer Program funding to directly fund any project that is a covered source and is described in Section 44281. CARB reserves the sole authority to distribute this State Reserve funding. For Fiscal Year (FY) 2021-2022, the State Reserve funds have been allocated towards Moyer eligible lawn and garden equipment.

Under the 2017 Moyer Program Guidelines, CARB may provide funding toward the replacement of lawn and garden equipment for projects that support the deployment of alternative, advanced, and cleaner technologies. In support of the 2021 Small Off-Road Engine (SORE) Regulation amendments, FY 2021-2022 State Reserve funds will be directed toward paying for the replacement of SORE-powered lawn and garden equipment with zero-emission equipment. This would provide further support for the governor's goals to transition California to 100 percent zero-emission off-road vehicles and equipment by 2035 where feasible according to the Governor's Executive Order N-79-20.

This State Reserve Project Solicitation is directed at providing monetary grants to offset the cost of commercial grade zero-emission lawn and garden equipment within the air districts. Staff will work with air districts to modify Chapter 9 in order to expand equipment eligibility in the Moyer guidelines. Once the modified, expanded guidelines are finalized to include the eligibility of commercial grade zero emission lawn and garden equipment, districts can move forward with the projects contemplated under this solicitation.

ELIGIBLE APPLICANTS

Air districts that are willing and able to administer the Moyer Program and meet the requirements listed below are eligible to apply for this State Reserve Project Solicitation to support the jurisdictions in transitioning California to zero-emission equipment.

ELIGIBLE PROJECTS

This State Reserve Project Solicitation is directed at providing monetary grants to offset the cost of non-residential lawn and garden equipment within the air districts. Eligible projects are limited to commercial grade zero emission lawn and garden equipment utilized by landscaping operations that include, but are not limited to, landscapers, cities, non-profit organizations, schools, businesses, or sole proprietors. All projects must be eligible in accordance with the Moyer Program Guidelines, Chapter 9.

AVAILABLE FUNDING

In FY 2021-2022, CARB has approximately \$24.7 million for State Reserve projects. The funding has been allocated toward eligible lawn and garden equipment projects under the Moyer Program. If there are not sufficient applications to encumber funds, at CARB's discretion, the Executive Officer may reallocate the funds to other Moyer eligible projects.

AIR DISTRICT REQUIREMENTS TO PARTICIPATE

In order to participate, the air district must agree and obtain a signed board resolution or board minute order that states the air district is able to:

- 1. Receive and expend FY 2021-2022 funds toward commercial grade lawn and garden equipment projects eligible in the Moyer Program.
- 2. Comply with current Moyer Program Guidelines, mail-outs/advisories, and other written guidance by CARB.

If an air district is unable to obtain a signed board resolution or board minute order by the end of the application period, the air district must indicate on the application the scheduled board date.

The deadline for Resolutions and board minute orders to be received by CARB is June 30, 2022. Should an air district require additional time to obtain a resolution or board minute order, beyond the date specified, or require a model resolution, please contact your State Reserve administration lead for additional assistance.

ALLOCATION AND APPLICATION PROCESS

FY 2021-2022 funds toward the replacement of commercial grade lawn and garden equipment projects supports the deployment of alternative, advanced, and cleaner technologies. Allocations will be calculated based on the formula described in H&SC, section 44299.2 and the number of air districts that apply. Participating air districts will be awarded a minimum amount of \$200,000 and are not required to provide match funding. Applications must be complete and accurate and will be reviewed based on the requirements listed above. An air district that applies and agrees to the above requirements is eligible to receive funds. Administration fees will be included in the final grant award in accordance with H&SC, section 44299.1.

The State Reserve application must be completed, signed by the air district, and returned to CARB **no later than April 4, 2022**. Air districts must send completed applications by email to *MSCDGrants@arb.ca.gov*.

GRANT AWARD AND DISBURSEMENT OF FUNDS

Application review will be completed by **April 15, 2022**, and successful air districts will be notified shortly thereafter via email. A grant award will be made through a Grant Agreement

between CARB and the participating air districts. Once the Grant Agreement has been executed and all requirements have been met, payments will be made upon submission of a grant disbursement request by the participating air districts. Air districts may request their entire grant award in the initial disbursement. To fully execute the Grant Agreement and thus encumber funds, Grant Agreement coversheets will be sent to the air districts to be signed and returned by the due date assigned by CARB following the solicitation period. Otherwise, funds may, at CARB's discretion, be transferred to another participating air district or be spent on other Moyer Program eligible projects pending CARB allowance via a subsequent mail-out. All funds must be liquidated no later than June 30, 2026.

MONITORING AND REPORTING REQUIREMENTS

The reporting requirements are located in the Moyer Program Guidelines and are to be followed accordingly.

I. INTRODUCTION

The Northern Sierra Air Quality Management District (District) is interested in receiving proposals from qualified firms to provide auditing services to the District, for the fiscal year ending June 30, 2023 in conformance to the *Minimum Audit Requirements and Reporting Guidelines for California Special Districts*, pursuant to Government Code Section 26909.

The closing date for submittal of a proposal is October 28, 2022 at 4:00 PM. All questions should be made to Gretchen Bennitt, Air Pollution Control Officer.

II. SCOPE OF WORK

- 1. Prepare and submit a letter to the Controller of the State of California notifying of the District's exempt status from a single audit report (due to absence of federal funding).
- 2. Examine and audit all books, records, and accounts of the District in accordance with generally accepted auditing standards and in conformance to the *Minimum Audit Requirements and Reporting Guidelines for California Special Districts*, pursuant to Government Code Section 26909, including a review of internal controls and financial organizational structure and such listing of those controls, financial transactions and records of the District (and County of Nevada, as necessary) to express an opinion on their financial conditions. Such opinions on the financial statements shall be in conformance with generally accepted accounting principles.
- 3. Test the bank reconciliations including cash on deposit with the Nevada County Treasurer as of the balance sheet date and such other times as necessary.
- 4. The audit firm shall prepare the financial statements and audit reports required by, and in the format required by the *Minimum Audit Requirements* and Reporting Guidelines for California Special Districts, pursuant to Government Code Section 26909, including:
 - a. Prepare General Purpose Financial Statements, including combined balance sheet, revenues and expenditures, and equity.
 - b. Prepare and submit an annual financial audit report to the State

Controller's Division of Local Government Fiscal Affairs (LGFA). This report shall include a Statement of Assets, Liabilities, and Fund Balance.

- c. Prepare and submit to LGFA an *Annual Report of Financial Transactions of Special Districts*, as mandated by California Government Code Sections 53891, et seq.
- d. Copies of all reports shall be sent to the Northern Sierra Air Quality Management District Board of Directors, P.O. Box 2509, Grass Valley, CA 95945.
- e. Copies of all reports shall be sent to the Nevada County Auditor-Controller, Eric Rood Administrative Center, Nevada City, CA 95959-8617.
- 5. Review existing accounting practices to ensure compliance with Chapter 3.5 Sections 11340 et seq of Part 1 of Division 3 of Title 1, Generally Accepted Accounting Practices (GAAP), the California State Uniform System for Accounting Procedures, and to all applicable laws.
- 6. Prepare a comprehensive annual management letter and report that speaks to the internal control strengths and weaknesses, including recommendations affecting financial statements, accounting, accounting systems, and any other relevant information or recommendations for more efficient operations. Submit the management letter to the District Board of Directors, Air Pollution Control Officer, the State Controller's Office, and the Nevada County Auditor-Controller.
- 7. If necessary, prepare and submit a Report on Internal Control Structure per the requirements of SAS No. 60.
- 8. Assure the District is in compliance with GASB 34, as it applies to a special district.
- 9. Reports shall be submitted no later than February 28, 2024, and an earlier date is desirable. Two (2) copies of the *Audited Financial Statements* and *Management Report* shall be submitted to the District office.
- 10. Attend a Board of Directors meeting, if requested, to answer questions regarding the audit reports and management letter.

Section D. Project Description

This request to the Northern Sierra Air Quality Management District under the AB2766 DMV Surcharge Fund will provide Incorporated Senior Citizens of Sierra County (ISCSC) with the funding needed to offer and sustain the two vehicles used to provide bus services or "vanpool services" in eastern Sierra County. The Transportation Program of ISCSC provides rides to all residents to doctor and physical therapy appointments; to pick up medications in Portola as there are no pharmacies in Sierra County; brings people to grocery shop; pick up mail; and offers monthly social outings to restaurants and venues that give people something to look forward to. ISCSC anticipates that approximately 2100 one-way trips will be provided during 2023. The program has provided as many as 4 trips in a day, serving up to 15 residents per day, both in and out of Sierra County to 200 unduplicated riders. Funding provided by this grant will be used for some of the cost of fuel, vehicle operations, and maintenance for two existing vehicles. Without this grant support, ISCSC will be forced to significantly reduce van pool service for the coming year. This reduction, combined with the continued challenges of Covid-19 restrictions, particularly in this frontier community, would further isolate rural seniors and disabled participants in seeking and securing transportation services needed to access health, wellness, food/medicine, and social service programs within the region. The program also provides "vanpool services" to community members at large as needed.

With this funding, outreach services to new unserved and underserved riders will account for a 10% increase in current service numbers. The program will provide riders with educational information on vanpooling and its related emissions reductions to encourage additional use of "vanpool services" in Sierra County. The program currently maintains daily statistics on the number of people served, trips provided, and miles driven for all transportation services. ISCSC has designed a data collection spreadsheet specific to Northern Sierra Air Quality Management District reporting so drivers may track and monitor the number of trips reduced from participants

who would otherwise have driven their own cars, or had someone drive for them, had "vanpool services" been non-existent.

The Transportation Program Coordinator is responsible for the record keeping and progress reports associated with all transportation funding sources. ISCSC will utilize all appropriate data collection tools and reporting forms required by the Northern Sierra Air Quality Management District.

Section E. Project Organization/Background

Incorporated in 1976, ISCSC has provided a hub of services for local citizens. Beginning as a club, playing cards, providing civic leadership, the organization soon expanded to serve meals and then to provide eastern Sierra County with the only form of public transportation available in the area. Working with the Transportation Commission of Sierra County, ISCSC has provided rides to those without vehicles, senior citizens, youth, and the general population. "On-call" drivers, most are "seasoned citizens," and are utilized to drive one of the two vehicles that the service operates: a 10-passenger bus, and a 5-passenger van; both have room for wheelchairs. While the attempt is made to carry more than one passenger at a time, that does happen. When possible, trips are listed in the transportation calendar which is published monthly in the agency newsletter. This further promotes the goal of reducing emissions. Participants are picked up at their homes, or a place of their choosing, and dropped off where they choose. Usually, the driver will wait for the passenger to complete their business, avoiding a second, round trip. Emission reductions for this project will result from the decrease in emissions associated with auto trips replaced by vanpool services after adjusting for the increased emissions associated with the shuttle vehicle itself. ISCSC Transportation Program provides vanpool services to residents for the following purposes: medical appointment, nutrition site services, socialization activities, shopping trips, pharmacy visits, personal errands, and recreation. Riders are picked up and delivered to their homes, providing further reduction to emissions as residents do not have to drive vehicles to a vanpool lot or shuttle parking site.

ISCSC utilizes Quick Books accounting program to track expenses by funding source and pays for an annual audit from outside the community to ensure accountability to funders. Staff compile and report on numbers of trips and ridership, the number of miles saved, and any data that is required to meet the criteria of AB2766 funds.

F. Emission Benefits/Cost Effectiveness

The total lifetime emission reductions are as follows:

Nitrogen Oxides (NOx) 78 pounds per year Emission Factor/units: .17 grams per mile

Reactive organic gases (ROG) 70 pounds per year

Emission Factor/units: .15 grams per mile

Particulate Matter (PM10)

29 pounds per year

Emission Factor/units: .23 grams per mile

Estimated reductions in vehicle miles traveled (VMT): 90,000

Estimated number of one-way vehicle trip reductions: 2,100

Cost effectiveness: \$30.93 cost/pound

G. Work Statement

The Scope of Work for this project is outlined as follows:

Jan – Dec, 2023	Conduct data gathering, monitor progress
December, 2023	Submit final report

ISCSC offices produce a newsletter every month, which includes a transportation calendar listing different trips scheduled for the month. Others can sign up to go on those trips or call in to the volunteer receptionist to schedule a trip that meets their needs. If there isn't a specific date that the trip needs to be made, staff will review scheduled trips to see if the individual could accompany a trip already scheduled.

All "run sheets" (trip activities) are turned in to the Program Coordinator at the completion of the trip. The Program Coordinator then records all miles, the number of riders, and the equivalent of the miles and trips saved. This data is then gathered into a report and provided to funding sources on a monthly or quarterly basis, which includes monitoring progress towards grant goals. If on track, an invoice is sent to the funder.

Periodically, ISCSC will promote the Transportation Program, monthly in the newsletter, during congregate lunches, and to the public in newspaper articles. This is with the intent of reaching more citizens to increase ridership and provide this service to the underserved.

The Program Coordinator is also responsible for tracking mileage to determine when periodic maintenance is required on the vehicles, to keep them in peak condition. The Sierra County Transportation Commission owns the vehicles, ISCSC must maintain them. Vehicles are replaced every 4 to 7 years.

No equipment will be purchased with AB2766 DMV Surcharge funds. Operating costs, particularly fuel, will be the main expenditure of AB2766 funds. As necessary, salaries and maintenance are the secondary expenses, directly related to securing this grant.

While funding has been provided for more than the past two years, every year there are new passengers, and every year we lose passengers. However, costs have dramatically increased, especially for fuel. As this trend continues, it is not feasible to sunset this funding source when costs are skyrocketing.

Agenda Description: Wildfire Smoke Clean Air Centers for Vulnerable Populations Incentive Pilot Program (AB 836)

Issues:

The Wildfire Smoke Clean Air Centers for Vulnerable Populations Incentive Pilot Program was created pursuant to the adoption of AB 836 (Wicks) in 2019. The passage of AB836 allocated \$5 million statewide to create a statewide network of clean air centers where Californians who are being impacted by wildfire smoke may go to seek respite.

Guidelines from the California Air Resources Board require that any facility which receives funding from this program must be open to the public during wildfire smoke events. District staff, Julie Hunter and Duane Strawser contacted local Office of Emergency Services, City officials and school districts in each of the three counties of the Air District jurisdiction. Locations that serve as community evacuation shelters and/or heat/smoke shelters were identified. District staff then conducted interviews of the responsible facility managers to determine the need and use of portable air filtration devices. Some larger facilities, such as the Fairgrounds, Veteran Halls, etc have square footage that require more than one device.

The California Air Resources Board is providing oversight for this program, and the California Air Pollution Control Officers Association is administering the program for air districts. District staff applied to CAPCOA for \$48,200.68 to purchase filtration devices and extra filters. The District will not receive any administrative funds for this program. The District has recently been told that this funding will be granted, although the grant agreement has not yet been distributed. The District plans to distribute air filtration devices in communities throughout all three counties. Approved locations are attached.

Plumas and Sierra Counties are identified as low-income communities. A portion of Nevada County is identified as low-income community.

Our counties work closely with our OES office/s, Social Services, Health Dept. and the Non-Profit support sector/s to steer our low-income and Senior Citizen populations to shelter locations during all health-threat events (Warming Shelters, Cooling Shelters, Natural Disasters (Wildfire/Flood/Winter-Snow/PSPS etc.) and related events.

6. Plan for Deploying Portable Air Cleaners to Clean Air Center Locations

Staff from both Grass Valley and Portola offices will deliver the portable air cleaners to locations. Locations that will receive the portable cleaners first, will be those that have been identified in the list attached for number 7 below, based on: 1. Facilities that have agreed to store the portable air cleaners. 2. Facilities on the list that are most vulnerable. 3. Facilities indicated on the list that are impacted first by wildfire smoke (based on the opening of emergency shelters per county) 4. Shelter locations who have agreed to allow full/open access to all citizens regardless of Demographic status, and that can arrange to allow 24/7 access as/if needed beyond their normal business hours will receive priority Filtration device deployment. Because our District covers three counties, identifying which facilities will be operating emergency shelters will be highly based on what communities are experiencing smoke impacts. All portable air cleaners will be stored at the Grass Valley and Portola offices until deployed. 7. NSAQMD staff provides constant AQI information and messaging to communities during wildfire events and operators of emergency shelters are aware of how to obtain air quality information. NSAQMD staff will be working with each facility to ensure proper use of the portable air cleaners as well as the tracking of air quality via AirNow and/or the Fire and Smoke Map.

Agenda Description: Mosquito Fire Smoke Impacts

Issues: As of this writing, the Mosquito Fire in Placer and El Dorado Counties is at 64,000 acres and 20% contained. Smoke impacts have been mild to hazardous throughout all three counties of the Air District, depending upon the meteorological conditions.

Air District staff provided health advisories and worked with the media to get messages to the public on how best to protect themselves from wildfire smoke. Additionally, staff worked daily with the Tahoe-Truckee School District and Nevada County Public Health Agency to provide daily smoke forecasts to determine school attendance.

AIR QUALITY HEALTH ADVISORY -- SMOKE

Monday, September 12, 2022 - Ongoing Nevada County

The Northern Sierra Air Quality Management District and the Public Health Departments of Nevada County are issuing a Joint Air Quality Health Advisory due to smoke impacts from the **Mosquito Fire** in Placer and El Dorado Counties, CA. Smoke impacts could result in poor air quality conditions and could vary throughout the day. Air quality conditions change rapidly, and smoke may be intermittent and affect different areas dependent upon wind direction and time of day. For the most recent Smoke Forecast for your area please see: https://outlooks.airfire.org/outlook/76d08bea

Poor air quality has the potential to cause negative health impacts, particularly for sensitive groups and when exposure is prolonged. Exposure to elevated PM2.5 (fine particulate matter in smoke) concentrations can result in eye and throat irritation, headaches, nausea, shortness of breath, congestion, coughing, impaired lung function and chest pain, especially among sensitive individuals such as the elderly, children, people with asthma, people with heart or lung conditions, pregnant women and anyone who is exercising or working hard outdoors.

If you smell or see smoke around you, the following actions are recommended:

- Stay indoors. Minimize outdoor activities even if you are considered healthy. Those with health-related illnesses, particularly breathing problems, should remain indoors. Follow the Environmental Protection Agency's recommendations for creating a clean air space in your home. https://www.airnow.gov/sites/default/files/2022-02/how-to-create-a-clean-room-at-home.pdf
- Snug fitting N95 masks are effective in protecting the wearer from smoke particles. Re-use of N95 masks may reduce effectiveness and make breathing more difficult. Surgical and cloth masks are not effective in protecting against smoke damage to the lungs due to the very small particle size.
- **Medical care.** If you experience chest pain, chest tightness or shortness of breath, seek medical care immediately.
- Adjust AC to avoid drawing in smoky air. If you have a central air conditioning system in your home, set it to "re-circulate" or close outdoor air intakes. Change your air filter on a regular basis.
- Reduce other sources of indoor air pollution. Smoking cigarettes, using gas, propane
 and wood-burning stoves and furnaces, spraying aerosol products, frying or broiling
 meat, burning candles and incense, and vacuuming can all increase particle levels in a
 home and should be avoided when wildfire smoke is present.
- Reduce physical activity to reduce inhalation of smoky air. During exercise, people can increase their air intake as much as 20 times from their resting level.
- Avoid getting ash into the air as much as possible. Avoiding sweeping ash up dry, use
 water and wet cloth/mop to clean items and surfaces. Wear a well-fitting respirator mask,
 gloves, long-sleeved shirts, and long pants when cleaning up ash. Avoid skin contact. If
 you do get ash on your skin, wash it off immediately. Some wet ash can cause chemical
 burns. HEPA filter vacuums could be used, if available.
- Monitor children and young adults. Do not allow children to play with ash or be in an area where ash-covered materials are being disturbed. Wash ash off toys before children play with them. Clean ash off pets.

Poor air quality has the potential to cause negative health impacts, particularly for sensitive groups and when exposure is prolonged. Exposure to elevated PM2.5 (fine particulate matter in smoke) concentrations can result in eye and throat irritation, headaches, nausea, shortness of breath, congestion, coughing, impaired lung function and chest pain, especially among sensitive individuals such as the elderly, children, people with asthma, people with heart or lung conditions, pregnant women and anyone who is exercising or working hard outdoors.

If you smell or see smoke around you, the following actions are recommended:

- · Minimize outdoor activities even if you are considered healthy.
- Stay indoors with doors and windows closed as much as possible; run the air conditioner on the "recirculate" setting if that is an option. Follow the Environmental Protection Agency's recommendations for creating a clean air space in your home. https://www.airnow.gov/sites/default/files/2022-02/how-to-create-a-clean-room-at-home.pdf
- People with asthma should follow their personal asthma management plan.
- People with heart disease, respiratory conditions or chronic health issues should stay indoors.
- Contact your doctor if you have any symptoms of cough, shortness of breath, chest pain, or severe fatigue;
- N95 masks are not recommended unless you have to work outside for extended periods of time. Due to the high temperatures, it is encouraged that people not work outside unless absolutely necessary and wear a properly fitted N95 mask.
